CHIMES IN THE CLASSROOM The Case that Lights Up My Students' Eyes By Janet Nordstrand

As soon as students enter my classroom and see the chime cases in the centre of my carpet, someone exclaims a version of "We get to play the chimes today!" No matter what gender, age or culture, chimes are an instrument that the majority of my students love to play, especially the big ones! Chimes are a wonderful tool to enhance learning in the elementary classroom. I utilize chimes many times throughout the year with all of my 380 Kindergarten to Grade 7 students.

Chimes require classroom management! The simple task of removing and returning them to cases, care and use take direct teaching. Care for the instruments is a must, and just like all instruments in my class, stop must mean stop and never touching the clapper is a must. This is very hard for all students, and requires reminders at times and sometimes taking away a chime for a short time if students are not properly caring for the instrument.



My Kindergarten students begin with the chimes when I am teaching the musical alphabet. We explore the letters on the chimes looking for letters that we know. Following that, we play and explore higher and lower leading the children to train their ears. They love to tiptoe for the high chimes and crawl on the floor like snakes for the low chimes.

Rhythm and melody are easily taught with chimes to grade 1 and 2 students. We play four and eight beat patterns in pentatonic, and create beautiful harmonies together. As students begin to explore melody we play the chimes to discover *sol* and *mi*, eventually adding *la*, *re* and *doh*.

I am fortunate to have two sets of chimes, one three octave and one four and a half octave, in my classroom. If there are not enough chimes for everyone, students have a partner and switch back and forth. When they are not playing, they can watch the partner and tell them something observed about the playing, they can show the melody with hand signs, tap the rhythm on their body, or



play it on other melodic instruments such as xylophones or boomwackers.

Grade 3 students use chimes to create their own melodies. They love to work in small groups of three to four students creating their own song. If they need help rhythmically, I encourage them to take a song we know, and create a new melody to it. I challenge them to explore notation and write down part or all of their song, and for private piano or instrumental students I encourage them to write their songs with traditional notation. At this time

> Overall, chimes are an excellent, affordable way to diversify and individualize learning in the music classroom. They spur students' excitement for music, and are lovely to hear even at their loudest (unlike recorders and drums!). Students' eyes shine with joy when they create beautiful music playing this unique instrument.

I also introduce computer notation software programs (I use Finale through my district license). I am fortunate to have a projector in my classroom, and one group's melody gets inputted into the program to expose the students to technology in the music classroom.

In Grade 4 and 5 I use the chimes in all the above ways, but additionally use a more handbell choir approach and teach a unit on handchimes and play traditional handchime music.

In Grades 6 and 7 Chimes are used in all of the ways listed above, but at a higher skill level.

KAMLOOPS INTERIOR SUMMER SCHOOL OF MUSIC Bells at KISSM

•his summer, the bells from the Kamloops United Church Music Program participated in the Kamloops Interior Summer School of Music (KISSM) at the Kamloops School of the Arts. What an exciting, interesting and fun challenge it was for us! The bells were part of the "sampler program," which meant a different group of students for each week of the three weeks that made up the program. Several of the ringers from Harmony in Hand and Bells of Note came along to help out and it couldn't have been done without them. The students were from grades 5 – 7 and before we started we had no idea of the number of students we would have each week, whether we would have students by their grade (age) or if they would be mixed. We also didn't know if the students had played an instrument before, if they could read music or if they had had any exposure to music prior to arriving for the summer music program. Preplanning for this was interesting!

The first week, we had eleven students—just enough for three octaves. The second week, there were 15 students—so we slipped in a few chimes—and the last week there were nine students. We only had the students for an hour each day for the first two weeks and only an hour a day for three days the last week because of extra rehearsals needed to get ready for the public showcase concert and the four musicals that were produced by different age groups in the three week summer school. And we thought the bell program was a challenge!

The students were amazing. Only some had had previous exposure to music and many did not know how to read music or the value of the different notes, yet, they were playing recognizable music at the end of the first day. It needed a lot of work, but it was recognizable. On the Friday of weeks 1 and 2 the group played a mini concert for the other students in the music school: two songs the first week and three songs the second! There just wasn't enough prep time in the third week for a mini concert. Several of the students elected to come to bells for all three weeks of the "sampler," and asked, "Are we going to do this next year?" The bell bug is alive and well! It was an amazing experience and we loved it. We are very much hoping that bells will be included as a class next year with the same students for three weeks with an hour and 15 minutes for the class each day, as well as running the sampler sessions. There was a lot of interest in bells, not just from the students, but from the college age mentors and the instructors. One teacher expressed an interest in having bells at his school in the fall, which we will



follow-up with, and there was also a request to use bells as a team building session for the faculty of the School of the Arts this fall. Many thanks to Jan Nordstrand and Handbells, Etc. for music suggestions and to the ringers who helped us make this program such a success.

AN INTERNATIONAL EXPERIENCE **European Handbell Festival**

When I saw the European Handbell Festival advertisement in the IHS2016 program guide last summer, I was wondering what it would be like to ring with ringers from other countries with a diverse repertoire representing the participants. Since I missed the opportunity to ring at IHS2016, being otherwise occupied as a member of the planning committee, I registered for the European Handbell Festival 2017 to make up for my lost opportunity last summer.

The tour started in the Netherlands with 58 ringers from the USA, Canada, Puerto Rico and Germany. Each participant prepared at home and rang together for the first time under the baton of Debbie Rice in a five-hour rehearsal the day before our first concert at the Church of

St. John in the town centre of Gouda. The Church of St. John is the longest church in the Netherlands, decorated with beautiful stained glass and designated as a UNESCO heritage site. The Pärnu Handbell Studio from Estonia also joined

us in our first two concerts as a guest choir. Each guest choir also performed their own pieces as part of the concert program.

Our second concert was held in Loccum Abbey, a Cistercian monastery built in the Romanesque period, in the town of Rehburg-Loccum in Germany. This is a wellpreserved 700 year old church surrounded by a stone wall. The Handglockenchor Wiedensahl joined us as the local guest choir. By the time the concert started, the church was packed and folding chairs were added to accommodate a growing audience. It appeared that the whole town had turned out for the concert. They did not want to leave after our final number and we had to play one of our pieces again as an encore.

After two concerts on consecutive days, we finally got a day of rest and were able to fit in some sightseeing on our way to our next destination. We spent the day at Würzburg, visiting an 18th century palace, beautiful churches and the old town centre.

Our next destination was Nuremburg. We performed at the Gustav-Adolf-Memorial Church in Nuremburg

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together with the First English Handbell Choir. We played to another full house and an appreciative audience. We took in a full day of sight seeing in Nuremburg the next day and explored the old castle and the old



town, the 10% that was not destroyed in WWII.

Our next concert was at the Schönaich Community Centre, the home of our two ringers from Germany. Schönaich is a small community approximately 25 kilometres from Stuttgart. We performed with the GLOX Handglockenchor, a community choir founded in 2013. The sheer number of bells and ringers spellbound the GLOX ringers.



We performed our final concert at St. Jacob Church in Zurich. Our guest performers included the Student Chimers of State College Enge and two vocal choirs as well as a duo. The duo performed two of their own arrangements where handbells, deskbells and recorded tower bells were used. We also premiered a bell arrangement of a Swiss folk song, "Come, Little Shepherd" with the Talerschwingen, a Swiss tradition that consists of moving a silver coin in circles within a ceramic bowl creating a characteristic sound similar to distance cowbells. The concert ended with the audience singing the canon in "Come, Little Shepherd."

The performance schedule was physically and mentally taxing—hauling tables, foams and equipment into old churches with no elevators, no air conditioning and in one instance no restrooms inside the church. Often times, we could only fit in a short rehearsal prior to the concert due to the long distances we had to travel and a tight schedule.

choir. I have used them to play arranged choir/handbell pieces and have also written my own arrangements. For partner songs, chimes can play the second song instead of having the choir play in two parts.

Orff arrangements are an accessible way to integrate chimes into the classroom. Bass borduns can be played on the low chimes, and higher ostinati (repeated patterns), can be played on the 5s and 6s.

Periodically in the year we have free playing time when students can use almost all of the instruments in my classroom. They always ask for the chimes to come out of the storage room to play, too. It is important to share chimes with the larger school community. Playing at assemblies and concerts is important for parents to hear students musically in a variety of ways. Additionally, at student led conferences, parents and students play chimes at stations in my classroom to highlight their understanding of musical concepts they have learned.

Overall, chimes are an excellent, affordable way to diversify and individualize learning in the music classroom. They spur students' excitement for music, and are lovely to hear even at their loudest (unlike recorders and drums!). Students' eyes shine with joy when they create beautiful music playing this unique instrument.
